Oral History Project the McCarter Family By Deacon Virgil Scott and Dr. John H. Rivers

M.C. McCarter was born in 1919 in Louisiana. He moved to Mississippi at the age of three. He married his wife, Isnell in Macomb, Mississippi in 1938, 71 years ago. Mr. McCarter moved to Oroville in 1946 to find work while living with his uncle in a house on C Street in Southside. Like many other African American men who settled in the segregated black community in Southside, M.C. came here first and prepared a way for his family to join him.

With a third grade education and the inability to read Mr. McCarter started at the High Sierra Lumber mill in 1946 and moved into the construction field sometime there after, which did not require him to have reading skills, "just a strong back and a willingness to work".

M.C. and Isnell raised eight children who graduated from high school, two attended college and one (Charlie) graduated from Chico State University. Mr. McCarter is proud of the fact that he learned to read in his early eighties because the demands of daily living required him to do so. As he continually expressed to his children and others who would listen, "It is better to have an education and not need it, than to need an education and not have it". Many of us are grateful and better off because the McCarter Fam-

ily operated a business <u>THE FRONT</u> that catered to youth and adults by providing a social and culturally rich setting. They continue to engage in a small business by providing housing for men on the corner of Burlington and Wyandotte Ave in South Oroville.

Notes from African American History

William Leidesdorff was born in 1810 to a white father from Denmark and black mother from the Virgin Islands. His family moved from the Virgin Islands to New Orleans when William was a small boy. He relocated to California in 1839 and like many others who came west during this time, he became a naturalized Mexican citizen. The Mexican government gave Leidesdorff a land grant of 35,000 acres nestled on a bay on the California coast which include the current city of San Francisco. Eventually he lost the title to the land. At 29 years of age, he became the first black diplomat of the Mexican territory of Yerba Buena, a name still borne by an Island in the San Francisco Bay. Leidesdorff became a financial adventurer and builder after the United States annexed the California territory from Mexico. In 1847, he launched the first steamboat on the San Francisco Bay. Later, he built the first and largest hotel in Yerba Buena, known as the City Hotel.

Leidesdorff was one of the town's most prominent citizens, served as the city's treasurer, established its first public school, and organized the first horse races in the state. He died in San Francisco at the age of 38 and left no will or heirs to his estate. Joseph Libby Folsom, an army captain living in the Bay Area located Leidesdorff's uneducated mother in the Virgin Islands and bought his entire estate which was valued at \$500,000, for \$8,000. The purchase was a windfall for Folsom and clearly unethical. After his death in 1847, Leidesdorff's body laid beneath the stone floor of downtown San Francisco. He became the first black man to have a street in downtown San Francisco named after him. The street runs through the heart of the financial district, and pays tribute to this black pioneer.


